Metro patrons want better frequency

Numbers Are Boosted By Office-Goers, Air Travellers

Chennai: Ridership on metro trains has picked up and
commuters want the frequency of services during
weekdays to be increased to
prevent crowding during
daily commutes. Officegoers returning to work and
the increase in operations of
domestic flights have been
steadily boosting metro rail
patronage since it resumed
services in September after
the five-month nationwide

Chennai Metro Rail Limited (CMRL), which had been operating trains at five-minute intervals before the lockdown triggered by Covid-19 began in late March, now runs trains in both the corridors and the direct service for every seven minutes during peak hours and every 10 minutes during non-peak hours.

Regular commuters say they find it inconvenient to travel particularly during peak hours as the trains are crowded and that it is difficult to follow any physical distancing. Women passengers say first class coaches.

which were recently converted into women's only coaches, too are crowded during the morning and evening peak hours. The reduced frequency is also leading to more passengers waiting for trains especially at interchange stations like Central Metro.

"Passengers sit or stand very close to each other on trains despite the markings to help them follow social distancing. But the crowd during peak hours is so much that it is difficult to follow rules. It would be convenient for regular commuters like me if they increase their peak hour frequency to five minutes, like they used to operate before they closed services in March." said Geetha, a government employee who takes the metro to office from Thirumangalam.

CMRL officials say around 45,000 people are using metro trains every day though it is only one-third of the pre-Covid numbers when an average of 1.16 lakh people used the service daily.

"All passengers wear masks while entering the station as it is mandatory but a few of them remove after getting inside the trains. Besides the increase in frequency, there should also be staff on the train to regulate passenger crowding in one place and make sure all of them wear masks inside the trains as well to ensure others feel safe," said Vijay Kumar, a regular commuter from Egmore.

Officials say passengers are mandatorily checked for temperature and provided with hand sanitizers. "We allow passengers only if they wear a face mask. Frequent announcements are made both in stations and on trains to wear masks and maintain social distancing," an official earlier said.
